MEETING MINUTES
PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE MEETING
JUNE 6, 2016
GERMANTOWN VILLAGE HALL BOARD ROOM

CALL: The meeting was called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Chairman Hughes.

ROLL CALL: Chairman Hughes and Trustees Baum and Daniels. Trustee Myers arrived at 5:37 p.m.

Also present were Police Chief Hoell, Fire Chief Weiss, Deputy Chief Delain and Clerk Goeckner.

PUBLIC COMMENT: no discussion.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: a motion was made by Baum, seconded by Daniels, to approve the minutes of the May 2, 2016 Public Safety Committee Meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

POLICE DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT: Hoell reported on the following:

- Active shooter drill held at Kennedy Middle School on May 6th
- National Law Enforcement week began on May 15th, the Washington County Law Enforcement memorial was held on May 19th
- Both police & fire departments had Narcan saves
- Leadership Germantown organizers will be holding a golf outing on June 9th to raise funds for the Germantown Police Department Honor Guard
- The department assisted with the arrest of a carjacker
- Residential burglaries with front doors kicked in
- 2 recent incidents at area schools including a bomb threat and a weapons incident
- D.A.R.E. graduations
- New officer, Troy Heaney, sworn in
- Hoell posed a question on facebook regarding department staffing numbers, he said the post received more than 4000 views and on the average people were guessing that there are 2-3 more officers per shift than what are actually on duty

POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT: Hoell advised the annual report covered the events, highlights and numbers for 2015, and any questions could be forwarded to him.

FIRE DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT: Weiss reported on the following:

- Department responded to structure fires at Hilltop Mobile Home Park, La Chimenea, Royal Court, Meadow Court, and provided mutual aid to Menomonee Falls for 2 structure fires
- 25 citizens were trained in CPR
- Reviews were conducted with several businesses on their safety plans and evacuation plans
- The implementation of the "Fire Chief's Weekly Letter" which is forwarded to all members and includes training information
- Commented on the good working relationship between fire and police departments

OVERTIME REPORTS: Police Department - Hoell reported that the police department is tracking slightly higher than normal due to staffing issues. He added that all positions have been filled but several officers are still in the training process.

Fire Department - Weiss reported that he had no overtime information for this meeting, he would provide the information at next month's meeting.

Trustee Myers arrived at this time, 5:37 p.m.

POLICY UPDATES: Police Department - none. Fire Department - none.

NEW BUSINESS: *Hughes advised that all of the following license approvals are to be conditional upon compliance of all code violations/requirements and monies owed to the Village paid prior to issuance of licenses in addition to any other conditions noted.*

ANIMAL FANCIER LICENSE THROUGH 12/31/16 TO PAUL & CYNTHIA SMITH, W140 N13629 COUNTRY AIRE DRIVE: a motion was made by Baum, seconded by Myers, to forward this application to Village Board with a recommendation of approval. It was noted that the owner would be responsible for notifying the Clerk's office when updating any of the dog licenses. Motion to approve carried unanimously.

Motion to approve all of the above, with the eligibility of #3 Buzdum's Pub to be discussed at tonight's Village Board Meeting, was carried unanimously.

REVIEW OF OUTSIDE PREMISES HOURS: Hughes advised the hours for Outside Premise Extensions are currently allowed through 10PM and asked committee members if they felt the timeframe should be reviewed. He added there have been requests for extended hours with Outside Premise Extensions.

Clerk Goeckner advised that Municipal Code Noise Ordinance 9.07(2)(b) specifically addresses noise issues between 10PM - 6AM and would need to be amended if the committee chooses to change the times for Outside Premise Extension hours.

Mr. Hastings with Old Town Inn was present and stated he would like the committee to consider extending his outside premise hours until 11PM or midnight, and noted that 11PM was in place when he purchased the business. Hastings added that he has complied with all requests put to him by the Village, and when noise complaints have been called in to the police department, decibel checks were done and the noise was not found to be excessive in the past 3 years.

Discussion followed with Baum advising he would like to hear more from the public regarding extending the times for outside premise extensions. Hastings stated that he believed exceptions could be made with the times granted for outside premise extensions and has seen it done in other municipalities. Hoell added that past Village Boards have granted exceptions to municipal codes with the approval of the village attorney. Daniels suggested that no action be taken at tonight's meeting - he would like to get a sense of what other communities are doing and what kind of establishment would be covered under any changes as far as restaurant vs. bar. Myers added that he would like the village attorney to review this matter and look at the concept in general before proceeding with discussions.

A motion was made by Baum, seconded by Myers, to table this item until next month's meeting and post it so that there is the potential for public input and to obtain an opinion from the village attorney regarding what hours could be considered. Hasting added he would like to help with information on extended hours, Goeckner asked him to check into possible exceptions in other communities.

Motion to approve carried unanimously.

UPDATE OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES BILLING RATE - FIRE DEPARTMENT: Weiss advised that due to increased costs of EMS supplies, he has prepared a list of proposed billing increases which he has already cleared with the billing company. Revisions include the following:

- Advanced airway \$150
- Epinephrine 1:100 \$75
- Glucagon injection \$350
- IV Start kit \$75
- Narcan \$75
- Pro Splints \$75
- Mileage ALS/BLS \$18
- Inter-facility Transfer \$350
- Non-transport 5-10/yr \$150
- Non-transport 11-15/yr \$250
- Non-transport 16+/yr \$450

A motion was made by Baum, seconded by Daniels, to forward these amended billing rates to the Village Board with a recommendation of approval. Motion carried unanimously.

UPDATED AND REVISED FIRE PROTECTION ORDINANCE - FIRE DEPARTMENT: Weiss advised one of his goals was to update the Fire Protection Ordinance and he had done the revisions and forwarded them to the Village Attorney and the DSPS Attorney for their review. He advised that if the revisions were approved by the committee, they would be sent back to the attorney for proper formatting.

A motion was made by Baum, seconded by Myers, to forward the proposed updates/revisions of the Fire Protection Ordinance to Village Board with a recommendation of approval. Daniels directed Weiss to condense the ordinance changes and provide a summary of the highlights and important changes for the Board's review. Motion carried unanimously.

AMBULANCE REMOUNT BID RESULTS AND RECOMMENDATION: Weiss advised that the fire department had sent out bid requests for the remount of 2 ambulances to five companies that specialize in ambulance remounting. After receiving the bids, Weiss was recommending that they accept the bid with North Star Braun NW for \$269,296.00. He stated the bid includes repainting and new emergency lighting. Weiss noted that he has \$250,000 in his budget in the ambulance account and said he will need an additional \$19,296.00 if this purchase is approved.

A motion was made by Myers to approve the bid from Braun for \$269,296 for the remount of 2 ambulances. Motion was seconded by Daniels who added he was skeptical of this expense and had questions regarding how many years the ambulances would be in service after the remount process, if the work was warrantied, and how increased calls the department is experiencing would result in more wear and tear on the vehicles. Discussion followed with Weiss stating they take good care of their equipment and he does not anticipate needing a new ambulance for 10 years if the remounts are approved. Hughes advised Weiss to work with the Administrator and Finance Director to find out where extra funds may be available, adding he could not support this purchase request until he knows where the funds will be coming from. Motion did not pass with a 2-2 vote, ayes from Baum and Myers, nays from Hughes and Daniels. A motion was made by Baum, seconded by Daniels, to forward this purchase request to Village Board with no recommendation. Motion carried unanimously.

NEXT MEETING: Next meeting date set for Monday, July 18, 2016 at 5:30 p.m. at the Village Hall Boardroom. If there is a scheduling conflict for the Boardroom, the meeting will be held at the Police Department Annex.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:39 p.m.

Sec. 106-237. - Compression brakes prohibited.

(a)

Definition. A compression brake, commonly referred to as a "Jacobs" brake, "Jake" brake, engine brake or dynamic braking device, means a device primarily on trucks for the conversion of the engine from an internal combustion engine to an air compressor for the purpose of braking without the use of or in addition to wheel brakes.

(b)

Use prohibited. No person shall use a motor vehicle within the Village limits where the compression brake is in any way engaged or activated on such motor vehicle or any unit a part thereof, except for the aversion of imminent danger.

SUBJECT 30	Engine Brake Signing	

A. Purpose

One method of slowing the motion of a vehicle is to use the compression of the engine as part of vehicle braking. This method is often referred to as compression braking or exhaust braking. Engine braking can produce excessive, undesirable noise when muffler systems are not functioning as designed or are otherwise inadequate.

Noise from engine braking in vehicles with inadequate muffler systems has led some communities to take actions to restrict the noise. Compression braking is typically an unavoidable result of operating a vehicle that the driver cannot prevent or fully disengage. However, for some vehicles there are driver choices as to whether or when engine compression braking is used. Objectionable noise levels *may* be produced by any car or truck when using compression braking and often are related to equipment failure or aftermarket modifications.

There are several advantages to compression braking on vehicles and especially on large trucks. In addition to assisting deceleration, when a truck engine brake system is engaged, it helps prevent the conventional truck air brakes from overheating, thus saving on the normal wearing life of the truck air brakes. This is especially true on roadways with steep downgrades with long distances, where the safety of the truck can be enhanced by the use of engine brakes.

Communities have installed or requested signing on state highways to address noise concerns associated with use of compression braking. The Department controls traffic signs on highways maintained by the state. Local governments do not have the authority to erect signs on those highways except when written permission is provided by the Department.

The Department supports efforts to deal with excessive noise from all vehicles and encourages enforcement of laws requiring effective mufflers (for example, State Statute section 347.39). The use of signs specific to engine or compression braking has become popular among many communities, although it is unclear whether those signs are effective or necessary. Generally, the Department does not allow installation of traffic signs on state highways that have not been shown to be necessary or effective.

In the case of engine braking, the Department has chosen to work with communities and allow limited use of these signs on state highways under certain conditions, despite the lack of evidence that they are effective in reducing noise problems.

B. Policy

The Department *may* permit local governments to place signs on highways under WisDOT jurisdiction subject to the requirements included here:

1. A permit will be issued only when the local government has in place a noise ordinance that provides a basis for enforcing the sign(s). The noise parameters listed in Wisconsin Administrative Code - Chapter TRANS 405 *may* be used to help set noise level criteria.
2. Requests for a permit to allow these signs must be in writing to the WisDOT Regional Office and *should* contain the following information:
 - locations where signs are to be installed, including State highway route number and distance to the nearest public roadway intersection
 - sign offset (distance from edge of travel lane) and type of post to be used
 - assurance that sign will be free standing (not attached to other signs)
 - copy of local government noise ordinance
3. The local government **shall** be responsible for supplying, installing, and maintaining the signs in conformance with the permit. The local government **shall** furnish their identification sticker on the sign.
4. The local government must be committed to actively enforce the requirements of the signs with local law enforcement personnel.
5. Only the standard NO ENGINE BRAKING EXCEPT IN EMERGENCY sign (R10-64) *may* be used on highways under State maintenance responsibility and those signs *may* be installed only on conventional highways at or near the corporate limits of the community (See Figure 1). This sign **shall not** be used on freeways, expressways, interchange ramps, or site specific locations on conventional highways.
 - a. The optional WITHIN CITY OR VILLAGE LIMITS plaque (R10-64F) *may* be used to supplement the R10-64 sign when there are persistent or perceived problems with enforcement of engine braking on the roadway throughout the community (see Figure 2).
 - b. For freeway locations going through communities, Engine Brake signs *may* be permitted on conventional state highways after the entry point to the conventional highway from the freeway, provided signs are already approved at the city/village limits.
 - c. Engine Brake signs *may* be allowed for urbanized townships provided they have an ordinance and the means to enforce it. Documentation **shall** be provided by the Local Law Enforcement indicating that the ordinance will be enforced throughout the township. Urbanized townships are defined by having

at least two of the following features:

- Township population of at least 5000
- Urban cross section
- Residential development abutting the highway that meets the definition of “Semiurban District” as defined in Wisconsin State Statutes 346.57(b).
- Reduced speed zone
- Qualify for an unincorporated community sign

For qualifying urbanized townships, only 1 sign is allowed in each direction on any given state highway. The signs **shall** be installed at the township limits.

- d. Due to potential concerns for the safety of truckers and other motorists, the signs **shall not** be used for steep downgrades that meet the following conditions:
- 5% grade and more than 3,000 feet long
 - 6% grade and more than 2,000 feet long
 - 7% grade and more than 1,000 feet long
 - 8% grade and more than 750 feet long
 - 9% grade and more than 500 feet long
 - Any grade steeper than 9%, regardless of length
- e. The local government must obtain the approval of the appropriate Regional office for the location(s) of the sign(s). The sign language **shall** meet the requirements of the WisDOT R10-64 and R10-64F sign plates as described in item 4.
- f. Any other signs related to use of engine braking installed on highways under WisDOT jurisdiction within or for the local government that do not meet the requirements of this policy **shall** be changed by the local government to comply with this policy or be removed.

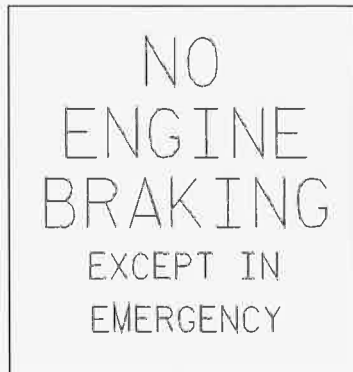

(R10-64 Sign)

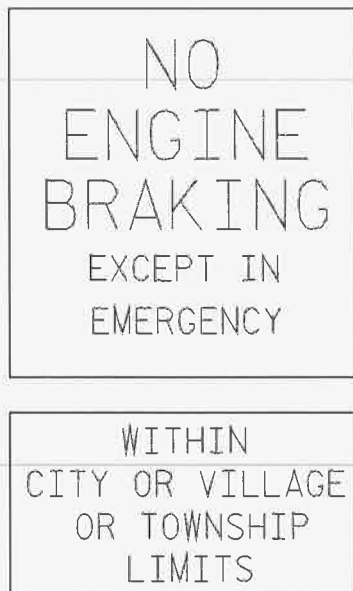

Summary Explanation: The fire department is respectfully requesting to purchase with funds from account # 10-522-570-8100 nine Unication G1 Pagers for the fire department. We have \$5,200.00 for a Portable Water Tanks and associated accessories. Currently we have issued all of our pagers and no spares or additional one for new members.

Since we received one portable water tank under a Grant (non-matching grant) we can delay purchasing the second one. Additionally I will apply of the same grant again for the second tank.

Per the quote each pager would cost \$549.00, this includes an extended warranty of 3 years (for a total of 5 years of warranty). Additionally we would purchase one (1) G1 Programmer so we can program the pagers and not have to send them out.

I would like approval to purchase t total of nine (9) Unication G1 pagers and one (1) G1 Programmer for a total cost of \$5000.00.

I did contact Unication for cost and they referred me to General Communication as the local authorized dealer.
